First Curly

Since I met my wife Anne, I have been very fortunate to have a great marriage which has been made all the better by my relationship with my mother-in-law, Ingrid Fulcher. Ingrid and I share two things in common. She is fascinated with computers and she loves horses. I'm a computer consultant and a typical week-end waddie (i.e. a city slicker who dresses up as a cowboy to ride horses occasionally.) My wife, who grew up with horses, became allergic to them right after I proposed. So instead of riding off into the sunset with my wife, I regularly go trail riding with Ingrid, where we talk for hours about horses.

By September 1992 our core riding group had grown to 4 with both of my children now riding (Tiffany age 10 and Lawrence age 8). And with my niece Melissa (age 9) starting to ride as well, we felt we needed a fourth horse. All of our horses to date had been Quarter Horses. So with *all* of the family gathered about for the weekend, we naturally set out to look for another Quarter Horse. Or more precisely, a large (15+hh) horse that everyone could ride.

The classified ads for horses in our local paper were unusually few in number with less than a dozen listed. And out of those ads only two held our interest. The first ad was for a 10 year old quarter horse, and the second was for a 6 year old American Bashkir Curly gelding that was (16.2hh). What on earth is a Curly horse? The

horse books we had only listed a Bashkir Curly. And these Russian horses were usually only 13hh-14hh. Besides, we all knew that horses look their best when their hair is short and shiny. I had gotten beyond the 60's short hair was in!!

So we looked at the Quarter Horse first. Of course the horse hadn't been ridden for a while, but with the temperature in Mojave at about 110 F, I couldn't see this horse ever warming up to anything more than a slow walk. PASS!

Judy Davis the owner of the Curly, could not meet us until late in the afternoon. So I asked her to describe her Curly.

"Yes, he was tall."

Good!

"Yes, he was gentle."

Good!

"No, he hadn't been ridden in a while"(this must be a prerequisite to any horse being sold).

"OK", I said wearily.

And then she through me for a loop. She told me he wasn't Curly now.

So with our interest piqued about seeing a Curly that wasn't, we went to look.

Roman Red (ABC #P469), better known as Teddy, was gorgeous. And not just as a non-curly Curly, but as a horse. It showed that he hadn't been ridden for a while, but there was great potential. And when I asked Judy about a horse cart I spotted on the property, she said Teddy was trained to pull, too. With Judy throwing in the training cart and harness we purchased Teddy, which started our adventure.

I called the ABC Registry to find out about registering

Teddy. Need I say more when I tell you I spent a good hour or so on the telephone with Sunny Martin finding out all about Curlies! And when I told her we lived near Los Angeles, she popped the biggest surprise of all. ABC needed another rider for the 1993 Rose Parade, and would I be interested. Is the Pope Catholic?

With paperwork flying between ABC, the Tournament of Roses and myself, we were in. "Now how do you think Teddy will do". my mother-in-law asked? With false confidence I said he would be fine, after some practice runs. So we quickly entered our family in the two local Christmas parades.

The day before the first parade we got a foot of snow at the ranch. Being firm believers that your horse must be clean, we gave poor Teddy a bath during the snow storm (at least we did use warm water). The other 3 horses were lucky enough to have gotten their baths the day before.

We had two things go right on Parade day. First, it was a gorgeous bright sunny day. Second, we were near the end of the parade. We had to wait for three hours before our turn, and by that time Teddy had tired himself out. Curlies might be gentle and good natured, but nothing prepares a horse for all the noise and commotion involved with a parade.

The second parade was one week later. As soon as Teddy exited the trailer, he looked at me as if to say: Not Again! Needless to say he is a fast learner, and he managed this

parade without too much difficulty.

On to Pasadena

Activates for the Rose Parade start about 5 days before the big parade with the Tournament's Equestrian Reception. This is where all the equestrian riders get together to meet one another, show off costumes, and feast on a spectacular meal.

Since this was my first parade, I was looking forward to meeting the other ABC riders. The invitation says to come either in your riding outfit or formal cocktail attire. So I assumed it would be easy to spot the other ABC riders because we would all be dressed alike. WRONG. I was the only one to wear 100% of my outfit. It wasn't until the party was half over that I found Norm & Lou Ann Dills. They steered us in the direction of the other ABC riders, and at least I'd know who to look for the next day.

The morning after the reception, the ABC Riding Group gets together for their first riding practice. We hold practice and board our horses at the LA County Fairground in Pomona. This is a great spot because they have several indoor riding arenas, and did we ever need to be indoors the first day. The rain came down in buckets.

By the second day the rain had stopped, and we rode around the fairgrounds. Now we started to get a feel for where the horse and rider felt most comfortable. The fairground is huge, within easy reach of the parade route and has nice accommodations for boarding your horse.

Dayle Johnson was our

Marshall; and unlike most riding groups, he chose to ride in the middle of the group. We decided on a 3-2-3-2 riding arrangement. Besides me, we had two other first time Rose Parade riders. The other riders in our group have been in many Rose Parades, and they all had great stories to tell.

The night before the New Year's Eve our group gets together for a very nice dinner at the Pomona Mining Company. This restaurant is situated on a mountain overlooking the lights of Los Angeles. It's a nice quiet time to sit around, swap riding stories, and get to know everyone. The food was great and the evening was capped off with fabulous cowboy poems from Sunny Martin.

December 31st is our last practice ride and is capped off with a horse bath party. Fortunately it was a nice sunny day, so both horse and rider dried off quickly. At least as quickly as a Curly horse can.

For lunch, Sunny made her famous Clam Chowder which goes well after a bath. The horse stalls are restocked with lots of fresh hay, and we're off for an early night's sleep. I've never heard of anyone in our group tearing up the town on New Year's Eve.

Our wake up call is for 1:30a.m. but we're already a half hour behind the rest of the group. By 2:00a.m. we've got our horses loaded, and we're ready to roll on to Pasadena. The trip takes about half an hour. Our destination is the North bound side of the 110 Freeway, underneath famous Colorado Blvd.

Now you might think that getting up early on New Year's Day would be tough. Your right! Just as you're getting up and moving out, other folks are staggering home. Now we all have gotten up early before, and with the help of some caffeine, the wee hours of the morning are tolerable. Well guess again. What caffeine! Once you mount up, there are no "pit stops". You can't call time out during the parade and mosey off behind a bush. You're only as good as the size of your bladder!

Since we arrived before 3:00a.m. most of the repeat riders try to get some shut-eye while the new kids try to quell their excitement. Around dawn the sky starts to fill with helicopters and blimps, the band buses start to roar by, and the air begins to fill with electricity. For a first time Rose Parade rider, you start to realize just how big this parade is.

We begin to put our outfits on and saddle up the horses. The electric atmosphere has not bypassed Teddy. He's snorting and pawing and looking at me as if to say: "Load me back into the trailer and lets get out of here"! Around 7:00a.m. I mount up and try to reestablish my authority with Teddy. Fortunately, when Teddy gets nervous, his sides will twitch ever so slightly, but enough for me to feel it on my legs. Oh, what a leg massage I got that day!

By 7:30 our group is following a man in a white suit wearing a motorcycle helmet and driving a bright red moped. He leads us to the final staging area on Weaverly Street. Here we watch several of the floats go by

as we move up in line. We are approximately a half mile from the start of the parade, and the spectators are already 5 deep at our entrance to the parade route.

A little after 8:30 they somehow part the crowd, and we force our horses to move onto Orange Grove Blvd. I use the word "force" because all the horses see that here is no escape route once they are surrounded by the crowd. Teddy is particularly hesitant, and his whole body starts to twitch; and I suddenly realize that I'm sitting on top of dynamite just waiting to explode.

We coax our horses up to the next intersection where a large band from Australia with bright orange uniforms and colorful flags merges in front of us. Did I mention the flags? Have you ever ridden a horse within sight of a waving flag?

When Teddy saw these flags moving in front of him, he began to tuck his hindquarter underneath his body. This eyes, ears, nose and mind were totally focused on these flags. That's when a bad situation turned to disaster!

Without any real warning the band started to play, and the flags started to move in different directions. Well, that wasn't the only thing that started to move. Each Curly, in the blink of an eye, has spun 180 degrees around; and with boron tipped horse shoes we started a stampede towards the float behind us. The crowd, especially those sitting way down low on the curbs, instantly realized the seriousness of the situation and you could see the fright in their eyes.

With credit to the riders,

not one of us fell off. Because I was so aware of Teddy's thoughts prior to the stampede (my legs were getting the massage of a lifetime), I was the first to regain control by spinning him back around and bringing him to a complete stop. The rest of the riders quickly regained control and regrouped the horses.

All the riders were visibly shaken, and we did not have to tell each other that this was not a good way to start the New Year. However, no sooner has we positioned our horses back into formation, the most amazing thing happened. The spectators, who just a moment before had not only feared for our safety but for their own lives, began to cheer. The people sitting on the curbs stood. People with food in their hands put their breakfast in their mouth. People holding programs tucked them under their arms, and those who were holding children awkwardly freed their hands to give the Curly riders and their horses a rousing ovation.

This was one of the most moving gestures I have ever experienced. To have everyone realize that your skills had prevented a disaster and then graciously acknowledge your efforts, brought tears to the eyes of more than one rider!

With the exception of coaxing our horses under a freeway bridge while the band in front of us played on, the rest of the parade was anti-climatic and very enjoyable. And Teddy, well, his adrenaline never let up, and so we pranced the whole parade. This made him sweat profusely; but we still looked great because

he started off being very clean, and his prancing shook off all drops of sweat before they could gather into a later. In fact if he had not been a curly, he would have looked terrible with all his sweating. But because of his heritage, the sweating action just served to make his curly coat even more curly.

At the end of the parade we made our way back to our horse trailer. Teddy, who usually needs a little coaxing to get into the trailer, practically insisted on getting inside before I could dismount. And guess how supportive your legs are after prancing around for close to 5 hours! So here is our sharp looking group, everyone of us pain, clinging to our saddle horn, and begging our horses not to move while we try try straighten out our bowed legs.

After eating lunch and getting something to drink (something with caffeine), we say our good byes and head back to the ranch. Teddy is sure relieved when we get home. You have to wonder what they think when you take them away from familiar surroundings for a week. By 3:30p.m. I'm in bed and fast asleep for the next 15 hours.

Teddy has now endured two Rose Parades and is starting to adjust to his celebrity status as one of the Curly horses to appear in local parades. I can't say he is the only Curly horse any more because we have added 3 more to our stable. Look for all of us in the 1995 Rose Parade. I'll be the one waving all the time!

From Michigan

Joyce Giuliani of Vulcan, MI wrote to the Office about her curlies and a 4-H and Handicapped Riding class her curlies participate in.

There were 6 riders in the class and two of the Handicapped children came in first and second. They were riding on Joyces curly horses Boris and Katreena. The boy riding Boris took 1st place and Boris is a horse that can really be a "sinker" when he wants to be. The Boy was riding by himself without being led or held on the horse. The boy riding Katreena also was riding by himself and he took second in the class. The rest of the horses in the class were all being led. The instructor told Joyce that the Curlies were the only two horses that they could trust with riders like these without having to lead them. Both of the children riding Joyce's horses suffer from cerebral palsy. One of the children will be taking jumping lessons on her horse. Boris seemed to be totally different when he has a handicapped rider on his back. The instructor has asked Joyce to let her know if she ever decided to sell the horses. The instructor would like to take them down to Michigan State University where they really do a lot of handicapped riding programs. She was truly amazed at how good the Curlies are to work with and how they really seemed to "take care" of their special riders.

Thank you Joyce for sharing this with us. If anyone has

information you would like to share with other Curly Readers send it to the Office. It has been suggested we put more Curly Cues out each year, for this to happen we would need your help with articles and helpful hints in working with these wonderful horses.

- \$1.00 Per horse per issue
 - \$3.00 Per horse with a picture per issue
 - \$5.00 One years subscription to receive the list of horses 4 sale.
- This will begin in January 1995.

CONVENTION UPDATE

A convention update letter was sent to all members at the end of July, 95. This will become a yearly issue sent out after the convention. If you did not receive your please inform the office. Some of the major items voted on by the Board of Trustees were:

1. Adopt the A.I. rules and regulations proposed by board member Nancy Scott. This will take effect January 95. If you are

interested in this breeding program please write the office for more details.

2. Purchase a copy machine for the office. (The money from the raffle was used to purchase the machine.)
3. Report to the members how the board of trustees voted on each motion.
4. The board voted not to change the name of the Registry. It would be too expensive, and people are now beginning to recognize with the Bashkir or Curly horse and name.
5. To start the Horses 4 Sale list again.
6. To accept all horse show events, including Gymkana events for all ages for High Points towards the National Awards.
7. To change the term of office for all Board of Trustees. Starting with the 1995 election, the term of office will begin on January 1, of the following year.
8. The Breeders License may be in the name of a Ranch, Company or Corporation limited to one voted paid member of the Registry.
9. The name of a registered horse may not be changed at any time. This will take effect January 1, 1995. This way if a breeder wants the name of the ranch or farm in the name they can keep track of the blood line.

TRANSFER LIST OF HORSES

A list of horses that have been transferred is being kept by the Registry. Anyone interested in receiving this list may write to the office and be placed on the list to receive it. It will be sent out By-Monthly.

NEWS ITEMS

We are always looking for items of interest on our great horse. We would gladly include articles, news items, or stories related to Curlies. Please let us know when you publish an article or news item so that we can watch for it. Better yet, send us a clipping! If you are in a parade tell us about it. The more exposure the better it will be for our horses! We will be starting a Library for news articles and need your help. This way when someone wants more to read on the Curlies we can help.

ADVERTISING

Have a horse for sale??? For just \$5.00 per issue of the Curly Cues, we would be happy to add your horse to our HORSE CLASSIFIED ads.

There is also a by monthly list that is sent to all persons inquiring about our horses. This cost \$1.00 per horse or \$3.00 if a picture is added. A new list is made every 2 months.

HORSES FOR SALE

You may receive the by monthly horses for sale list for only \$5.00 per year.

BREEDERS LICENSE

Whenever we receive a request for information about our registry or our horses, an information pack is sent out. One of the most important items in this "info pack" is a list of licensed breeders. A Breeders License entitles a holder to advertise horses for sale in our classified ads at no additional charge, as well as the breeders list published in our

newsletter. There is now an additional charge to register a horse if a licensed breeder is not used. The current list of fees can be found on this page.

VIDEO'S OF CURLIES

Due to the number of requests we receive for video tape of curly horses, plans are now "in the works" for a CURLY HORSE VIDEO. Parts of the video will be used to advertise our horses and the tape will be available for sale at the registry upon completion. Any video tapes sent to us will be returned upon request. Also, anyone interested in assisting the registry in this undertaking please contact us.

DIVISIONS

FULL CURLY- consists of any good Curly-Coated Horse with both parents registered with ABC including ABC straight mares with #374 and under.

HALF BASHKIR (HB)- consists of any Curly-Coated Horse with known or unknown parentage, with one or neither parents registered with ABC. Their off-spring, if curly, will also be accepted in this division and so on down the line until pedigree shows two generations of ABC registered Curlies in which case that off-spring will be eligible for the ABC (full Curly) division of the Registry.

STRAIGHT- consists of any straight horse with both parents registered with ABC. Stallions are not eligible but can be registered with number and certificate pending until gelded in order to keep track of bloodline. Off-spring from ABC straight mares, if curly, will be eligible in the Half Bashkir Division.

OWNER OR LESSEE of mare at time of foaling is legal owner of foal, therefore responsible for registering the animal. Lease notification should be sent to the ABC office to be recorded.

ABC HORSE SHOW RULES AND REGULATIONS

The ABC Board of Trustees voted to accept the Rules and Regulations for Horse Shows and the point systems, submitted by member Corine Mead in 1992. The Rules and Regulations, forms and fees are at the office. If you are interested in putting on a Horse Show or running for the national points and district points, write the office. In 1995, the Rules and Regulations will be followed completely.

RAFFLE

The Registry is starting a new raffle to help with expenses through the year. It will be a 50/50 Raffle. The rules are very simple: Ticket costs \$1.00. The weekend after Thanksgiving the drawing will be held. The winner will receive 50% of the total winnings and the Registry will

receive the other 50%. Our attorney has approved the raffle as it is legal in Nevada. Check with your state to see if it legal. You could always donated to the Registry. Look for the Tickets coming soon.

TRANSFERRING YOUR HORSE

There has been some confusion on transferring a horse. The fee is \$15.00 per horse. Send the fee, transfer form with both signatures, and the Certificate to the ABC Office. If the horse needs to be updated send in the required pictures and fees. The seller or buyer may pay the fee. Please indicate who will be paying this fee. Also, if there has been a transfer that has not been recorded with the office, the paper work and fees will be required for that transfer before the last transfer can be completed. It is the responsibility of the seller or buy to get this information, not the Registries.

A. I. BREEDINGS

The Board of Trustees voted at the 1994 Convention to accept A.I. as a breeding program for the members with a Breeders License. The Rules and Regulations for the program are at the Office. Please send for the information if you are interested in the program. A blood test must be performed on the Stallion and Mare prior to the breeding and the results must be in the Office. The registry is selling blood testing kits for

\$12.00. Send the test to Ann Bowlen of Davis, California to be tested the address will be provided with the information.

Any Senior member in good standing may run for Board of Trustee. This is a three year term and the yearly convention to attend. Send you resume to the office by May 10, 1995. There are two members at large and two districts up for election each year. Start thinking now about running for the board WE NEED YOU.

STRAIGHT DIVISION

At the 1992 convention the Board of Trustees voted to eliminate the straight division (horses with straight hair). This took effect December 31, 1992. AFTER comments from the members and a lot of discussion, the Board of Trustees voted to revise the vote of June 1992. The Straight Division will remain as is and register straight haired horses with curly blood. They must have two registered ABC parents. Any questions please do not hesitate to write to the office.

HALF BASHKIR DIVISION

The Half Bashkir Division is for horses with curly hair of either, one registered or, unknown parentage. The registration fee is the same as the Full Curly division. There is also an additional fee if a licensed breeder is not used. Any questions regarding this division can be sent to the registry office or contact member Bev Shultz, at (206) 943-6700, Chairman of the committee for the Half Bashkir Division.

Registration Rules to Remember

The Owner of a mare at time of foaling is the owner of the foal and is responsible for the proper registrations of that foal. If foal is sold and arrangements are made for the new owner to register and transfer, send a letter to the office to this affect.

When selling a registered Curly, Straight or Half-Bashkir the Certificate and Transfer of Ownership/Bill of Sale, together with the transfer fee of \$15.00, (the owner or buyer may pay the fee please stipulate when sending the certificate to the office.) must be sent to the ABC office for legal transfer by the Registrar. The Certificate will be then forwarded to the new owner. Please DO NOT give a registered horse's Certificate directly to the buyer. To Alleviate errors on a horse's pedigree, the Registrar asks that a xerox copy of titles to BLM

horses and certificates from other Registries be sent with application for registration. If preferred, ABC can copy originals and return to the owners.

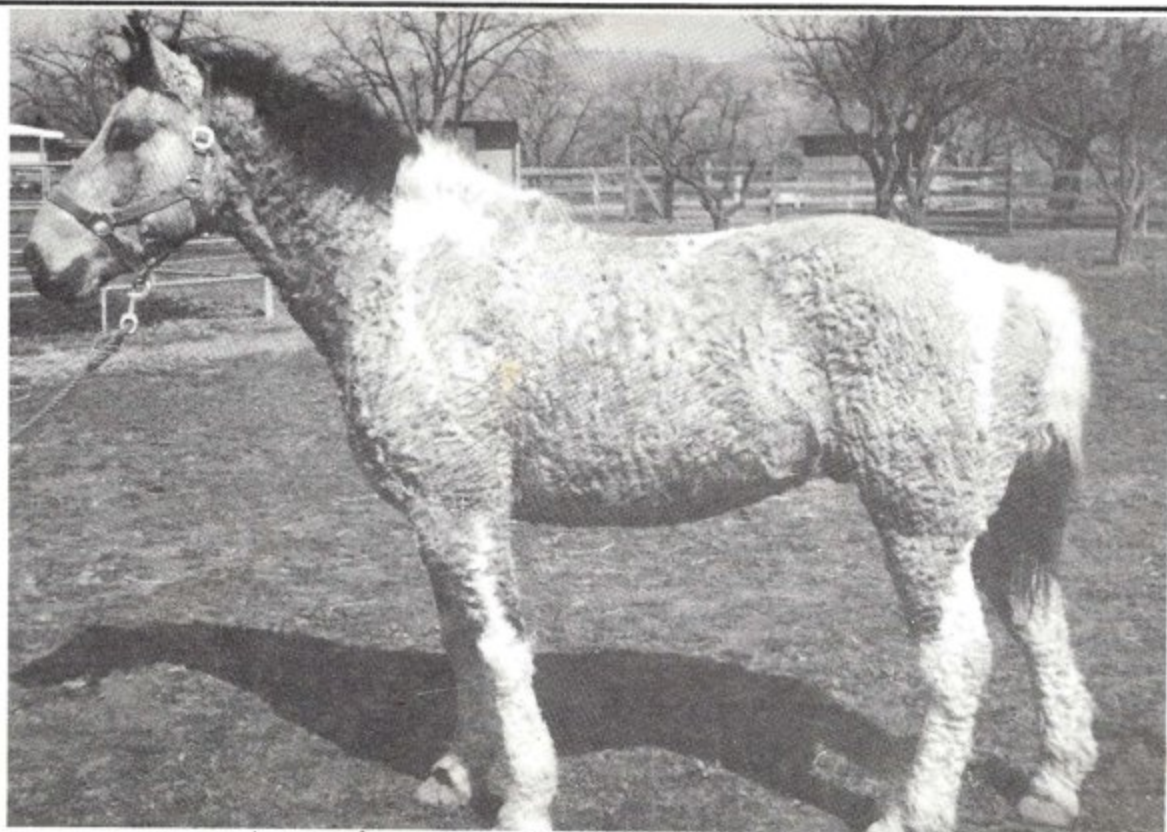
